PRIMARY TEACHER RESPONSIBILITES

- Please be prepared with a 25-minute lesson/discussion each Sunday. Curriculum and teaching ideas can be found online: *Come, Follow Me – For Primary*. Pray for each child in your class; adapt the lessons to their needs. Share personal stories and learn alongside the kids you teach! At the beginning of each lesson, ask each individual to share something from their week.

- Please be on time. Junior primary will meet in the Primary room right after sacrament meeting, Senior primary will meet in their classrooms for 25 minutes before we switch. Be there to welcome each child to your class.

- If you are unable to attend Primary, PLEASE find a substitute. Each month a substitute list full of wonderful teachers will be provided for you. Please contact our substitutes in advance. Consistent attendance will deeply benefit the connection you have with your class.

- If you have children who are absent, please visit them. Remember, they are divine. Your intention should be to share love and wonder, not attendance.

- Please reinforce reverence in your classroom, in the hall, and in the primary room. We all witness and express God's love in different ways, allow creativity! But please remember to be respectful of others' worship.

- Folders with print outs, roles, and other class information will be located outside of the primary room doors for senior primary teachers to pick up after sacrament. Leave the folders in the classroom for junior primary. Please sanitize the chairs and table in your classroom with the provided cleaner.

- Complete the *Protecting Children and Youth Training* (15 min.) if you have not done so in the past 3 years. As a reminder, we are mandatory reporters of abuse. We report all abuse to the police.

- We will hold Teacher appreciation gatherings every quarter. Please make a special effort to attend. We want to help you love your calling! We want you to feel supported, connected, and appreciated! Please let us know of any needs, ideas, or concerns you might have as a teacher in our ward's Primary.

Teaching Tips

- 1. Prayer is an important teaching tool. Throughout the week, ponder and pray about the principles in the coming lesson.
- 2. Almost every lesson has more material than you will be able to cover in class. Read the lesson and thoughtfully choose one or two main principles that you feel are best for you and your class.
- 3. Become familiar enough with the lesson that you can summarize the important parts. Do not read it from the manual.
- 4. Relate the lesson to your own life! Children love hearing personal stories about real people. Connect with the kids, ask them to share stories from their own lives.
- 5. Take comfort. You do not need to know everything to be an effective teacher.
- 6. Plan some simple questions that will allow your class members to share their experiences and insights.
- 7. As a teacher, you are called to learn! Teach what is fascinating, exciting, and new to you. Sing, dance, color, play learning games, prepare object lessons, etc.
- 8. Above all else: Love. Love those kids and feel our Heavenly Parents' love for them.




